Car Parks Update

Residents will have seen North Somerset Council's notices tied to lamp posts in Beach & Sand Road & Crookes Lane. This was part of their public consultation to get residents feedback before implementing the Parking Restriction area in these roads. The Parish Council had their public consultation at the back end of last year in the form of a newsletter to all households in the village. To be fair we only received nine letters or calls in response, which didn't seem many in view of the number of residents affected. North Somerset Council have had greater feedback, particularly from residents in Myrtle tree Crescent who had concerns that they really had limited

parking compared with the rest of the houses in the area that have longer drives. The residents worry was that should visitors or family arrive, they would have to pay to park at the terminus car park or risk a parking fine on the road outside their houses. These residents have been advised that if there is sufficient will, Myrtle tree Crescent could be omitted from the scheme. The reason that the parking restriction was called for, was that with the introduction of Pay & Display in the Car Parks, visitors will park anywhere to avoid having to pay. Ask any resident in Beach Road & Sand Road what it's like trying to get out of their drive on a fine

weekend in summer. This doesn't even consider how difficult it would be for the emergency services to get access.

The latest update from North Somerset Council concerning resurfacing and drainage work in the Terminus Car Park is that it has been again delayed. They expect it now to commence in January 2019.

An update on the Parking Restriction Order associated with the Pay and Display Parking at the Terminus Car Park. North Somerset Council has said that because of opposition from residents in some areas, they are looking at reigning back the areas covered by the order.

Waste & dog bins trial

The Parish Council have had meetings with North Somerset Council's officers about the dog and waste bins in the village. North Somerset Council have been trying to hand over responsibility of these bins to Parish Councils for them to maintain and empty to keep their costs down.

The purpose of our meetings with them was to drive home that Kewstoke and our beach are a 'destination area' with people coming from miles away to walk their dogs and enjoy our beautiful beach with their families.

Therefore the 15 dog bins and various waste bins need to be emptied and that it would be extremely unfair for us as residents, having to shoulder the cost of living in a place that people wanted to visit.

The outcome of our meetings is that together with North Somerset Council is that they are going to trial an alternative to what we have at present.

Currently we have dog bins next to waste bins and gaps on the seafront with nothing at all.

On the Village Green we have within a few metres two waste bins and a dog waste bin. As dog waste can now be put into normal waste bins and that there is a cost every time each bin is emptied, we are going to try to consolidate this. As a trial where there are dog waste bins

and waste bins next to each other on the beach or around the village, the dog bin will be removed and re-sited into areas on the beach where there is no dog waste bin.

An example of this is in Crookes Lane. There is a dog waste bin on the Village Green, one on the corner next to the footpath onto Church Walk and a further bin outside the Village Hall.

The trial is to remove the bin on the entrance to Church walk. This will mean that the dog waste has to be put in the bin on the Village Green or Village Hall.

This shouldn't be too onerous as people will be turning either right or left and will pass a bin within a short distance.

This is just an example of how the number of bins can be reduced and consolidated. It is a trial. If it doesn't work, it can be amended.

If by working with North Somerset Council, the we can help to reduce their costs, we may avoid having the burden being forced onto our precept, for which each and every one of us will be paying as part of our Community Charge.

Coaches accessing the M5

One of the best summers in living memory! Not quite so great if you happen to be a resident living on Kewstoke Road. This year has been the worst for coaches leaving Weston via the Toll Road and coming along Kewstoke Road to get back to the M5.

Coaches have come along and got stuck, damaging vehicles, garden walls and residents properties as they have to be reversed back to where they can find an alternative route out of the village.

After representation by Kewstoke Road residents to the Parish Council, we called upon our Local District Councillors to find a solution in the way of a Traffic Order prohibiting coaches from entering Kewstoke Road between the Crookes Lane junction and Anson Road junction. A Traffic order has been lodged with North Somerset Council and will be put in place sometime in the next financial year. This is between the 1st of April 2019 & 31st March 2020. So another summer of chaos ahead predicted.



We decided to have some 'advisory signs' professionally produced and set about village directing coaches down onto Crookes Lane and out of the village along Lower Norton Lane.



Their effect was instantly noticeable and it seemed that a solution to our wait for the Traffic Order was in place. That was until an eagle eyed resident reported the signs to North Somerset Council and we were asked to remove them.



Within an hour of taking them down, Kewstoke Road residents welcomed their first coach!

Further consultation between the Chairman and North Somerset's Highways Department have resulted in a compromise. If we could find locations that were not considered to be in the domain of the Highways department, we would be allowed to erect the signs as a temporary solution to our residents problem.

Kewstoke Chapel have kindly offered to let us put a sign on the corner of their car park at the junction of Kewstoke Road & Crookes Lane and another sign will be located on the verge of the village Green owned by the Parish Council outside the "Highways" area. At the time of writing, these signs are yet to go back up, as whilst we are active as a Parish, those of us doing the work have full time jobs and will fit this work in when we can.

So, in conclusion, there will be two yellow advisory signs being located in addition to those of the picket gates on the Toll road.

They are temporary, we don't want to clutter the village with yet more signs, and you now know the reason behind them.

An eventful celebration

And a big thank you to Home Farm who continue to surprise us with their wonderful displays.

Many events throughout the year, including Valentines Day, harvest festival, the balloon festival etc. are marked with a new display at the entrance to our lovely village.

Here are a few of my favourites:



Promenade & Boardwalk

There recently has been some adverse comments by residents using social media concerning sand collecting on the Promenade, the closure of the Boardwalk & disabled access in general. So, in response here is a prospective view.

The Boardwalk

The Boardwalk has been closed for safety reasons. Being constructed of wooden piles driven into the sand and with wooden hand rails and walkway, it has been in constant need of repair.

The cost of its upkeep has in recent years become prohibitive. This said, the new Coastal Footpath which will run along the sea front, will incorporate the path behind the Boardwalk and lead to the car park.

This is to be included in the general car park upgrade to the car park next to the Commodore by North Somerset Council.

When this happens, it will take away an item of some significant cost to the Parish Council and allow full disabled access from the promenade to the car park.

Sand on the Promenade

The prevailing South Westerly wind blows sand up from the beach onto the Promenade.

The Promenade whilst being a lovely place for all to have a stroll, run along with a buggy or to sit on one of the many benches to take in the view, it is primarily a sea defence system to keep the Bristol Channel out of our houses. There is no obligation to keep this free of sand.

The Parish Council have constantly tried to keep the sand on the beach with the installation of Chestnut fences which over time will let the sand build up behind them and off the path.

One lesson in recent years was not to install these fences in the summer, as visitors break them up, leave the wire in place as a trip hazard and make fires and barbeques with the wood.

The Parish Council have also placed big logs in the gaps in the dunes for the same effect.

Keeping the promenade clear for walkers and wheel chair users is a task that the Parish Council have undertaken voluntarily over the years.

They have had some help from organisations giving their time, but it's mainly down to Councillor Russell Adams's good nature and big tractor that the promenade is as clear as it is.

Everything that the Parish Council does in the way of maintenance, grass cutting, keeping the toilets open for visitors, keeping the promenade clear, costs money.

This money comes from the Parish Council Precept that is part of the Community charge paid by residents.

The latest worry is that North Somerset Council has advised that they will be removing financial support for the dog waste & litter bins.

The Parish Council have already had a one year reprieve and are currently in negotiation talks with them. For Kewstoke to take this on alone will cost in the region of £10,000 a year.

The question has to be asked: Is it fair for a small community the size of Kewstoke to be paying for toilets, dog waste & litter bin facilities for visitors? It is the duty of the Parish Council to spend resident's money wisely.

So before reaching for the keyboard, those of you that are prone to venting your spleen on social media, remember that the Parish Council cannot reply to your comments, but they are in the background making everything work.

Local History

As part of the History Archive, I review the Parish Council Minutes and compile information on a variety of subjects.

Thanks to the generosity of Cedric Thomas the records dating from 1894 to the 1990's have been preserved in bound copies. Here are a few of the items I have found:

26.March 1935 Celebrations for the Kings Silver Jubilee as follows:

George 5th.

Church Service.

Children's Sports in the afternoon in a field kindly loaned my Mr. Court.

Children's Tea in the Council School and the presentation to all children of appropriate beakers.

A meat tea for old age pensioners, the unemployed and their wives.

Dance for all parishioners in the school room with refreshments.

A Bonfire on the beach with some fireworks.

An orange to all children up to 14 years of age and a bag of sweets (the latter a gift from Mr. A L Hawkins.

The road between the Church and Post office to be suitably decorated with flags, bunting and banners.

Peals of bell by the bell ringers.

28th. Sep. 1936 Coronation in May of H.M.Edward 8th

Permission was given for a 1d rate to be levied to provide funds for the forthcoming Coronation in May. This would amount to approximately £12. 15s.(He abdicated)

25th. Jan. 1937 Coronation of H.M. George 6th

It was decided that the forthcoming celebrations shall be a charge on the rates. A committee was set up of the following- Mrs. Paradise, Miss Fisher, Mr. Bomford, Mr. W Urch, Mr. Hawkins, Mr. W. Hart and Mr. Martin.

19th. Feb. 1947 Admalty Site At Woodspring

The Council resolved that this experimental site was a danger to the community and is causing alarm by excessive vibration.

The shock of the explosives is a menace to property two miles distant causing displacement of roofing, ceilings and window frames whereby repairs have to be carried out as a result. the Council are defiantly opposed to the continuance of this site for such purpose. The Clerk will write a strong letter.

23rd. April 1947 Defence Posts on Sand Bay

It was pointed out that

Prisoners of War were engaged on the removal of the posts for the purpose of maintaining the sea banks at Sand Bay.

It is now realised that the posts are being sold to residents by the prisoners and delivered in quantities.

It was felt that if this continues there will not be sufficient material to carry out the work. It would be difficult to obtain wood at a later date and would be a considerable expense to the ratepayers. Axbridge will be informed.

18th. May 1953 Coronation Garden

The Coronation Committee requested the Parish Council to contact the Borough Council regarding the triangular piece of land at the Toll Gate for use as a garden, to be laid out with seats, sun dial and shrubs. The meeting was in favour of this suggestion.

18th. Jan. 1954
Messer's Knight & Andrews of Birmingham sent plans & particulars for a proposed miniature railway for the use of children to run from the woods end of the beach to Sand Bay House on a proposed site along the foreshore under the embankment.

The Council approved of the project but not along the route suggested.

21st. Nov. 1955

Public Access to Sand Point

A letter from the Ramblers association was read asking for Sand Point & Middle Hope to be open for public access. Mr. Smith proposed that the Parish support the Association in respect of declaring Sand Point an open space but the question of free access to Middle Hope 'we cannot support'.

11th. March 1957

Dust Bins

Mr. H Turner complained that he thought it was wrong that householders should have to take their bins , in some cases quite considerable distances, up to the gates of their properties for collection be the R.D.C. workmen. In his experience of other localities the men always collected the bins from wherever they might be.

The Chairman said this would put the rates up as it would take longer. The men were working strictly to orders from the Rural District Council. Mr. Pontin said ' they insist on the exact letter of the law'. Mr. Silcocks said that at present there was a fortnightly collection but he understood that the R.D.C. were purchasing a further vehicle with view to carrying out collections weekly.

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Korean-style BBQ Beef



Ingredients for 2 servings

- 1 ½ lb rib eye steak, or any other well-marbled, tender cut(700 g)
- 1 onion, 1/2 roughly chopped and 1/2 thinly sliced
- 3 spring onions, 1 cut into pieces and 2 sliced into 1/4-inch rounds
- 3 tablespoons brown sugar
- 1 teaspoon black pepper
- ½ cup soy sauce(85 g)
- 3 tablespoons sesame oil
- 1 tablespoon canola oil
- 1 teaspoon sesame seed, for serving
- cooked rice, for serving

Preparation

1. Slice the beef as thinly as you can, then set aside in a large bowl. Using frozen or cold beef will make the slicing easier.
2. In a blender or food processor, blend the onion chunks, garlic, pear, green onion pieces, brown sugar, pepper, soy sauce, and sesame oil until smooth.
3. Pour the marinade over the beef, add the thinly sliced onion, then mix to coat evenly. Cover with plastic wrap and marinate in the fridge for at least 30 minutes, or overnight.
4. Heat the canola oil in a large skillet over high heat. Pat the meat dry.
5. Being careful not to crowd the pan, sear the marinated beef and onions until browned. Sprinkle with the sliced green onions and sesame seeds.
6. Serve with rice and side dishes.

Grumpy Old Farmer

Back again by popular demand but only briefly as i have left writing this to the last minute before I go on my hols. I wonder which of the extreme weather i will get while i am away, will it be like the beast from the east or like the Sahara? Still whatever it will be good to get away. The weather this year has sensationally been varied with the beast from the east bringing snow and ice.

I wonder what they would have called the winter of 62/63. The thing about being an OAP is that you can say you've seen it al before. The sub zero temperatures did cause problems up and down the country including farmers with sheep who had started lambing with reports of lambs dying of the cold before they could stand that all seems a long time ago.

After that it was a wet spring and was unable to turn the cows out as soon as I had hoped when fodder was getting short. Eventually turned and the weather improved somewhat to become one of the hottest driest summers in memory. Although sometimes I think peoples memory aren't that long. With all the hot dry

summer weather hay making was frantic to try and get the hay made before the weather changed as it turned out I needn't have panicked as the hot dry weather just kept on going on and on.

Trouble is, I thought the grass for the animals dried up and so had to stat feeding the lovely hay we made which will make winter food supply short if we don't make a late cut.

Snow, drought, what will it be next, floods which brings me to my next topic of the maintenance of Kewstoke rhyne. I understand that there were some comments on the local facebook page that this was interfering with the wildlife as a member of the local drainage board i can say we have a duty of care towards wildlife while carrying out our duties with the removal of vegetation from the rhyne which is a very important job as Kewstoke rhyne is the main channel to take any flood water from the surrounding area to the sea.

Kelching, as this is called is done as much as possible out of the height of the bird nesting season to leave sufficient vegetation for invertebrates to get about their daily lives.

Pink Lady, Chia, Pecan and Hazelnut Breakfast Bar



15 minutes to prepare
Serves 8 bars

Ingredients

100g - Jumbo oats

100g - Pitted dates

100g - 40g for the topping - Pecans

100g - 40g for the topping - Hazlenut

2 - Pink Lady® apples grated and squeezed of excess juice

3 tbsp - Honey

3 tbsp - Melted coconut oil

2 tbsp - Chia seeds

Full preparation

Measure the jumbo oats into a mixing bowl.

Either finely chop the 60g of pecans and 60g of hazelnuts by hand or pulse in an electric blender until roughly chopped. Add to the jumbo oats. Do the same with the pitted dates until finely chopped.

Add the grated apples, chia seeds, melted coconut oil and honey and mix until all is coated.

Press the mix firmly into a lined tin and sprinkle with the remaining chopped hazelnut and pecans.

Leave to set in the fridge for an hour.

Cut to desired shape and size.

Scarecrows

A few years ago (2006 is the year I took part), Kewstoke and Sand Bay participated in a Scarecrow display to coincide with the harvest festival. Residents, the school and businesses took part and it put many smiles on people's faces.

I would be very keen to organise or facilitate such a local event again (Sept 2019) based on a theme chosen by the village (the most popular ones tend to be nursery rhymes/ cinema/ fairy tales/ books etc), if there was support from the Kewstoke/ Sand bay communities.

It would cost nothing to the Parish Council, would take little time in terms of organisation/ publicity/ making a few maps etc. and would create an event which would be fun, for all ages and would emphasise the sense of community/ies in the village.

The residents/ participants would be 100% responsible for their display following a few basic rules:

- to be placed within residences/ businesses boundaries
 - not on the roads/ pavements or public lanes
 - not in a position which would be unsafe or dangerous to horses/ cyclists and motorists
- not to be offensive etc.

A few words about me: I have been living in Sand Bay for a number of years, lecture at the University of Bristol and Open University, and parallel to this created the biennial North Somerset Arts week (2001 - 2013).
